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

INDOOR POOL PROJECT

Adamson Shaw surveys the pool

Carterton is making progress in its bid to upgrade the building, which houses the muchused indoor pool.

The project had a boost recently from the Wellington and Wairarapa surveyors Adamson Shaw, who completed a 3D laser survey at no cost. The scan simultaneously captures millions of laser points and photographs of the surrounding world, using a sensor that simultaneously spins and rotates at very high speed. This survey technology has become a new standard in construction and not only saves time but collects more than enough information for the building project in just one visit.

Gonzalo and Nathan from Adamson Shaw spent a morning conducting the scan and tying it into the nearby survey datum. The surveyors were able to do this work despite the aqua aerobics group using the pool at the same time.

Gonzalo has already processed the field data and prepared a floor plan that gives vital information about floor and ground levels. This is essential information for the design work that is about to get underway. The 3D

computer model is a complete picture of the entire site and surroundings – the basis for all design work and a historic photographic record of the old building. Meanwhile, the swimming club has just signed the specialist aquatic facility design consultants, CREATE, to lead the design. CREATE has recently completed an upgrade to the Makino Aquatic Centre in Fielding and are lead consultants for the new Pahiatua community pool.

The next step in the project is to confirm the needs of the pool user groups. At the same time, local contractors will be selected for partnering with the pool project to collaborate on the design and pricing of the new building.

Sabrina Sullivan spoke to Jiffry Mohamed and Sameena Dadamiya, owners of The Olive Branch.

Jiffry and Sameena took over the Olive Branch in January 2023 and are one hundred percent pleased with how it's going. They have what they call golden regulars who come from around the Wairarapa for their favourite dishes.

Jiffry's career as a chef has taken him from his native Sri Lanka around the world – from a beginning at renowned Italian restaurant Euphoria in London, to sous chef at The Kitchen Galle Fort, serving French influenced European food.

A wish to relocate the family to a peaceful place with good educational prospects for their son, led to a position with Salute restaurant in Greytown. However, Covid forced the closure of Salute in 2020 and Jiffry took up a new challenge, managing the kitchen at Wairarapa Village retirement complex in Masterton. "This was when I knew I was ready to lead and start my own business", he said.

Jiffry and Sameena are preparing to take the Olive Branch in a new direction. There will be new additions to the menu including a Sri Lankan favourite. "We would like to offer a combination of the dishes we grew up with, and familiar kiwi ones".

"The mixed grill is our signature dish because our customers love it. It consists of lamb, chicken and beef, marinated overnight and grilled to order. It is served with a choice of sauces, rice, fresh Turkish salad, hummus, beetroot and yoghurt with herbs. I love cooking it as it is a beautiful meal on our menu," Jiffry said.

"Without the locals no business can survive and we are so grateful for the amazing support we have had from the community. This community is beautiful. We feel that we are home".

GARDENING GUIDE

How does your garden grow?

Building a resource

I was given a garden diary for Christmas in which to record planting and harvest times by date and species, as well as the rainfall and max/min temperatures. What a great gift.

It isn't hard to do. Keeping a written record eliminates future guesswork and I know in time to come it will be a useful resource about our own microclimate.

The soil is still warm – above 13 degrees. Frosts were few in March/April. Rainfall remains well below average and our vegetables are watered daily from hose or can. Autumn greens are maturing as promised – broccoli from seedling to table in eight weeks. Beetroot has also performed very well. I'm looking forward to eating parsnip from the veg pods. If they are anything like the carrots we have been eating, I will be well pleased.

Currently we are experimenting with weed mat between our rows in the main garden and around the stems of citrus with good success. The weed burden has been decimated and it saves a lot of bending.

Now, prune out diseased or damaged wood on fruit trees. Burn the trimmings. In some areas you must get a permit. Prepare locations for bare rooted replacements. Dig in animal manure and let it sit for a month or two to rot before planting the new trees. On cold nights, cover young avocados, lemon trees and passionfruit. Bring frost tender plants in pots under shelter.

Broad beans and cover crops should be germinating. Add general purpose fertiliser where corn and potatoes last grew. Plant garlic, leeks, onions, and continue weed control in baby carrots.

Keep an eye out for pests. Cabbage white butterflies, slugs and snails are still very active in the garden. Grass grub is still a nuisance under the lawn.

Enjoy the last of autumn. Deciduous trees are glorious now, especially the massive ornamental trees in Queen Elizabeth Park, Masterton.

CARTERTON ROSE SOCIETY **Rose notes**

It's clean-up time

May is a good time to clean-up your rose beds.

Rake up and burn all the fallen leaves, to will prevent disease carrying over to the next growth season. Fungi may stay on fallen leaves so it's really important that these leaves are not put in the compost. Burn them.

Check your rose beds that you worked last month and keep them free of weeds. The roses will be coming dormant so there will be no need to feed or water them unless it is extremely dry.

It is too early to prune but a good time to spread mulch. A thick layer of mulch over your new and existing beds will help to improve your soil condition, there is no need to dig it in. Cuttings can still be taken.


Club member, Dorothy Hennessy, shared a brief overview of her

Have Your Say: Representation Review

We want your ideas on the future of Carterton's Council representation.

What's happening?

We want to hear your thoughts ahead of the Carterton District Council elections for 2025 and 2028.

We're required by law to hold a review of Council representation in our District every six years, and the next one is due now.

? Why do I need to know?

bw?

We need to ensure there is fit-for-purpose, fair, and effective representation for individuals and communities of interest in our District, and that they have their voices heard at Council level.

The Local Electoral Act 2001 gives individuals and community groups the right to make a written submission to Council on its proposed representation arrangements, as well as the right to be heard if they wish. There is also the right to appeal or object to decisions on the proposed representation arrangements. The Local Government Commission will then make a binding decision on any appeal.

? What's the current situation?

Since 2012, Carterton District electors have voted for one Mayor and eight Councillors "At Large". This means they represent everyone in the community, rather than a system where Councillors are elected to a section of the District, or ward.

When is the Review happening?

We want your ideas now! We're taking feedback until Sunday 26 May. Those ideas will form the proposal for the final shape of our district for the elections. We'll seek more feedback in July.

New aerator a breath of fresh air

Our wastewater treatment ponds are getting a breath of fresh air from a brand new aerator.

We were one of a select number of Councils working with Aeris Global on the new aerdisc model.

This aerator replaces the old paddle type, with improved oxygen transfer and water movement in Pond 3, for the same energy usage

This new type was developed three years ago as a method to improve the performance of the rotary aerators.

The timing is good as the old aerator was frequently breaking down and the seasonal change can be problematic for pond systems.

Temperature swings can disrupt the process causing odours to be released. Cold, still evenings can create a thermal layer that trap air close to the ground.

The effect is observed during winter where the mist forms close to the ground which disappears when the sun rises and temperature goes up. So the new, more efficient aerator will help to keep the ponds mixed well and stop any major temperature fluctuations.

As the library hit its memorable milestone in March, readers continued to enjoy the service, and new members signed up in their droves.

More than 100 new members joined our library, and 239 across WLS, in the first quarter of 2024. Carterton's Library issued 13,330 print items, and digital items were also popular. Across the four WLS libraries, 10,763 e-book, audiobook, and e-magazine items borrowed, and 170 new devices connected.

Square foot gardening

In the mid-70s an American, Mel Bartholemew, devised a new system for backyard gardens which is more efficient than the traditional.

Mel found that a densely packed 12 foot by 12 foot, subdivided square foot garden, was very effective. For example, a 4 x 4 foot square can be divided into 16 squares – using bamboo, and each square can have a different range of planting. A square could have in it one broccoli or four lettuces or nine beetroots, and so on.

A key to the process is what medium to grow your plants in. Mel devised Mel's Mix instead of garden mix. It's 1/3 vermiculite, 1/3 compost and 1/3 peat. The vermiculite acts as a sponge for retaining water. Ideally a mix

of composts is best. I could not get peat easily but used bark fines, which is a fine garden mulch. So, you begin with no errant weed seeds. It becomes an easy medium to work in too. Vermiculite in this volume is best sourced in bulk through an importer. We bought a pallet of it.

Our garden boxes are 600mm high but the first 300mm is gravel, and we can sit on the edge and garden. Currently we are mid-season so we are attacking the summer garden and planting a winter crop.



The importance of trust in healthcare

Questions are a healthy part of all successful rehabilitation processes. They are actively encouraged.

All of the international guidelines for the management of chronic pain state patient education as vital. Yet, with questions, there is a sweet spot. Too few questions can imply a lack of interest, while a great many tend to go with a lack of trust!

Alan had 15 or 20 times more questions than the average patient with similar pain. And there was a definite sense he wasn't very accepting of the straightforward answers he was being given.

Yet with Alan's first treatment, he felt substantially better immediately. Which is very common with shockwave therapy for shoulder issues. For the first time in three years, he could move his arm above parallel without any pain. Yet, after a moment of evident excitement, he returned very quickly back to "Mr Sceptical with lots of questions" mode. But we got through it.

After Alan's second treatment,

he felt even better, and the improvements lasted several days (the healing effects of shockwave therapy are cumulative, and it takes time before the pain relief is more lasting).

After Alan's third treatment, he had a reaction. He felt great immediately after the session, but in the following days he had a significant increase in his pain for 24 hours. Then it settled quickly, but didn't feel as good as it had done after the first two sessions.

Ultimately, Alan emailed to cancel his fourth treatment and I never saw him again. Somehow, that relatively tiny amount of adversity completely derailed the process for him. And the overwhelming sense was that he really struggled to trust anything I said. As such, I fully supported his decision to fire me.

The rehabilitation of chronic pain is a gradual process. And it's also one that it's hard to figure out alone. So, time and help are both required to navigate the stormy waters between chronic pain and a pain-free life. This means that practitioner/patient relationships are vitally important to get right.

There are two parts to a successful patient/practitioner relationship. Without them, the process of healthcare is doomed from the start.

The first foundation stone is integrity on the part of the practitioner. Enough integrity to be honest about what they are sure of, what they are unsure of, and what they think the probability of success is based on similar cases in their care.

The second foundation of a successful rehabilitation process is trust on the part of the patient. This means placing faith in the knowledge and good intentions of the persons who are caring for you, even if things get complicated.

If you find yourself with a practitioner you don't trust, do exactly what Alan did and seek other help. Even if they are doing an outstanding job, your lack of faith in them makes the chances of success very low.

Without a robust foundation of

practitioner integrity and patient trust, rehabilitation of chronic pain is virtually impossible. Keep searching for people and solutions you trust entirely until you find them.

If that means working through five different physiotherapists or five different osteopaths until you find one that you feel you can trust, so be it. The alternative is living with pain; and that's no way to live.

Lifting the street appeal of Carterton

There appears to be widespread support for a unified approach to lift Carterton's street-appeal.

A group of residents is forming to work with CDC and other organisations to improve Carterton's appearance. Holloway Street and some retail shops have upgraded, but that's lost by the overwhelming number of tatty buildings. The group understands the impact the earthquake-risk buildings have, however, steps could be taken to mitigate this.

Projects to improve Carterton such as – painting some buildings, individuals voluntarily cleaning shop windows and collecting rubbish – demonstrate community spirit but it's not enough. We need a cohesive, determined effort to progress.

There appears to be nothing in the Council's Long-Term Plan that supports upgrading the town. Consequently, in 10 years' time, things could be worse and businesses that have upgraded, may have failed.

The lack of a cohesive appearance due to no regulations is resulting in – Poorly painted buildings, colour and quality of finish, abandoned buildings with deteriorating signage and old posters, dirty shop fronts and windows, and general disrepair of verandas. Anecdotal evidence suggests people drive through Carterton because it's not appealing.

What's needed – Recognise there is nothing to prevent businesses or individuals doing anything with any building. There are no standards, that must change. Introduce guidelines (and bylaws) supporting the upgrade and ongoing maintenance; Council is not alone, but some things, only they can do. Consider engaging professionals to assist in creating a unified look, reflecting the community spirit and history that exists.

It would be negligent to not try to restore the beautiful style the Wairarapa is recognised for. We are custodians in our lifetime and have a responsibility to fix things.



A new Kiwi

We are thrilled to announce the arrival of the newest member of our kiwi whānau here at Pūkaha.

On 7 April, we were introduced to MB122, a precious kiwi chick hatched at our sanctuary.

The gender of the chick is unknown until maturity or until a blood test can reveal the answer. Until then, we eagerly await the opportunity to bestow upon MB122 a name that honours their uniqueness, in partnership with Rangitāne.

One of the most intriguing aspects of MB122's heritage is the unique combination of his or her parents' traits. Mapuna, the father, is a North Island brown kiwi with striking white plumage. In contrast, Manawa, the mother, exhibits the traditional brown colouring typical of North Island brown Kiwi. The offspring of this remarkable pair often inherit white patches, varying in size, which we keenly observe to see if they persist or diminish over time.

Looking ahead, we have set our sights on a significant milestone – when MB122 reaches a weight of 1000 grams. At this point, Kiwi can usually defend themselves against stoats, marking a crucial step towards eventual release into the ngahere here at Pūkaha.

Stay tuned as we continue to share updates on MB122's progress and eagerly anticipate the day when he or she can roam freely in the wild – a testament to the power of conservation and community collaboration.

CARTERTON HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Carterton Borough Gasworks

On 27 June 1905, the Carterton Borough Council (CBC) resolved to invite Mr C H Edwards of Napier to come to Carterton to provide an opinion on the pros and cons of building a gasworks in the town.

Mr Edwards was known to have a good level of expertise in the field and he agreed to provide the relevant advice for a fee of 20 guineas plus travelling expenses and accommodation.

Shortly after, on 4 August 1905, the council formalised approval for the construction of a gas works, and at a subsequent meeting on 29 August, decided that the whole town should be supplied with gas. A polling of ratepayers was held and of the 157 residents that responded, 119 were in favour, 35 were opposed and there were three



informal votes.

There is some confusion as to the next stages, but in October 1905 Mr Edwards was asked to draw up plans and specifications and to supervise the construction. The council secured a site at 178 Belvedere Road which contained an acre of land and was adjacent to the railway station and yards.

The confusion arose when council decided on 27 February 1906 that the total construction and installation would be undertaken by council staff under the supervision of Mr Edwards. However, records indicate that Mr John Herdman was appointed manager on 5 October 1906, "in full control of the gas works and everything connected with it, those duties to commence from 1 August 1907", but it appears that he started construction of the works with council staff undertaking the construction of the foundations for the gas holder and retort shed following his appointment in October 1906.

Coordinator of the Marty mural walk, Charlotte Harding, is putting a call out to local mural artists.


